

Declaring racism is a public health crisis, is an important first step toward acknowledging the unequal and unjust systems that Black Wyandotte County community members have to contend with on a daily basis. Words are not enough to begin addressing and reversing the harms those systems perpetuate. Action is needed in the form of policy reform and funding. In order to prioritize which actions should be taken first, we engaged our community to ask: What are your top priorities to dismantle systemic racism in Wyandotte County?

UNITY SESSIONS IN ALL MISSION DISTRICTS

In February and March of 2023, eleven community listening sessions were held throughout Wyandotte County. Dinner and a stipend was given to everyone who participated. Licensed therapists, childcare and transportation were available.

149 UNIQUE PARTICIPAN

Participants gathered in work groups to review data, talk about their experiences, and learn from each other. Some of the conversations were difficult and traumatic. Other conversations resulted in a sense of iov and healing that can only be found through community connection.

Participants gave input and selected specific policies and programs that they considered to be the most urgent and impactful ways to address systemic racism and its effects in Wyandotte County.

In the Kitchen

- When cooking, peel & clean vegetables in a large bowl of water instead of under running water.
- Fill your sink or basin when washing & rinsing dishes.
- Only run the dishwasher when it's full.
- Only use the garbage disposal when necessary (composting is a great alternative.
- Install faucet aerators.

In the Bathroom

- Take short showers instead of baths.
- Turn off the water to brush teeth.
- Shave in the shower or by filling the sink with water.
- Repair leaky toilets.
- Install a toilet dam, faucet aerators, & low-flow showerheads.



Water Conservation & Saving Tips for Summer

With the heat and humidity of summer near, water usage & consumption can go up. The Kansas City Board of Public Utilities (BPU) has compiled a list of recommendations to help conserve this precious natural resource, while also reducing the energy usage needed to process and deliver water to homes and business - which can lead to a reduction in overall utility costs.

Laundry

- Run full loads of laundry.
- When buying a washing machine, get a water saver model that can adjust to the load size.

Outside the Home

- Set the mower blades to 2-3 inches high.
 - Longer grass shades the soil which improves moisture retention.
- Only water the lawn when necessary, and avoid doing so in windy days, hot days, or during afternoon hours to reduce evaporation.
- When washing a car, wet it quickly. Then use a bucket of water to wash it. Only turn on hose to final rinse.
- Always use a broom to clean walkways, driveways, & porches rather hosing off these areas.



Stormwater Treatment Facilities are for Everyone!

Ever noticed the lush gardens at Wyandotte County Lake or Waterway Park? Or maybe the sprawling green spaces at Wyandotte County Youth Soccer Complex? These are not just your regular parks, they're actually Stormwater Treatment Facilities, or STFs.

Let's break that down. **STFs are basically nature's superheroes that combat water-related issues such as flooding and water pollution**. At the same time, they spruce up our parks and protect our rivers and streams. What's even cooler is that you can have these heroes right in your backyard.

Experiencing waterlogging in your yard after it rains? Here's how you can turn the situation around:

- Create a Rain Garden Picture a garden that doesn't just look great, but also works smart. That's a rain garden. It slows down rainwater, spreads it out, and helps it sink into the ground. This magic garden not only reduces water overflow but also purifies it, refills our underground water reserves, and creates a natural paradise for wildlife. Plus, rain gardens can soak up 30% more water than an equivalent patch of lawn!
- Set up a Rain Barrel This is a neat little device that collects and stores rainwater running off your roof. Imagine capturing 600 gallons of water from just an inch of rainfall. You can use this stored water for watering your garden, filling up birdbaths, caring for indoor plants, or cleaning your garden tools.
- Grow Native Plants Did you know our local plants can help prevent water runoff? They have deep roots that penetrate the dense clay soil in our area, making it easier for rainwater to be absorbed. As an added bonus, these plants often need less mowing, watering, or chemical treatment.

Here's the best part - the Unified Government has a special program to help you set up an STF at your home or business. However, there's limited funding, and it's given on a first-come, first-served basis. So, hurry up!
