VI. Wyandotte County Public Health Department

The Wyandotte County Public Health Department educates the public on the lead and its effects on our health. Lead is a heavy metal that can cause serious health problems. Lead is a commonly used substance and can be found in numerous products such as paint, ceramics, plumbing, batteries, and cosmetics to name a few. Most individuals are exposed to lead through lead-based paint which was commonly used on homes built prior to 1978. Young children and fetus are the most at risk to the harmful effects of lead exposure. Children under 6 years old absorb lead more easily due to their developing nervous systems. Lead can be found where children live and play like on toys, in dirt, and all over their hands. This often leads children to ingesting and poisoned by this toxic metal. If you see peeling or chipping paint on the inside or outside of your home, keep your children away from those areas to reduce chances of lead exposure. The health risks of lead exposure are impaired growth, hearing loss, behavioral problems, reduced IQ, decreased attention span, and severe cases can cause seizures, comas, and even death. The symptoms of lead exposure can be tricky to identify because they mirror many other illnesses' symptoms, for example, fatigue, diarrhea/constipation, high blood pressure, nausea and vomiting, flu-like symptoms, and loss of appetite are all signs of lead poisoning. A well-balanced diet and regular hand washing can help to reduce the chances of lead poisoning and its severity. Be sure to regularly test your child(ren) under 6 for their lead levels. Pregnant people should also request lead testing as part of their prenatal exams. If you have questions or suspicions that your home contains lead, call your primary healthcare provider and the Public Health department at (913) 573-6773. The Public Health department has a lead abatement program for pre-1978 homes. This program is available to both homeowners and renters.

Question: Renovation projects on pre-1978 homes need extra care and precautions due to lead dust spreading. What specific types of renovation projects need extra precautions?

Answer: <u>All</u> remediation for pre-1978 homes need to be handled with care by certified professionals. Exterior painting, structural changes (knocking down walls), or window repair and replacement are a few examples of projects that need special precautions completed by a certified professional.

Question: How can I safely repaint my pre-1978 home?

Answer: Be sure to use encapsulating paint to cover and abate lead-based paint.

Question: What resources are available for lead remediation?

Answer: kNOw Lead KCK

Question: What are the costs of lead testing?

Answer: Lead testing (or screening) can be quite expensive—especially if the tests are thorough. Call your primary healthcare provider or the WyCo Public Health Department for more information and assistance on lead testing or to make an appointment.

Question: Does the kNOw Lead program encapsulate or abate the lead that they find?

Answer: Both! However, due to funding, it is more common for the lead to be encapsulated.

David informs residents that the recent extreme heat is affecting the electric grid load. The heat can cause power shutoffs due to overheating of wires and machinery at the electric grid. BPU is watching these substations very closely. Here's how you can help reduce strain on the electric grid and practice energy efficiency: (1) Use electricity primarily during the off-peak hours which are early morning & late night, (2) Make slight adjustments to your thermostat instead of large adjustments, (3) use fans to supplement air conditioning, (4) utilize natural shading from curtains and shades, (5) close air vents in rooms you don't frequent often, and (6) use large appliances wisely and sparingly.

There have been some hurdles regarding collection of FEMA funds—there needs to be a state threshold of damage incurred to qualify, and while the county has hit the local required threshold the State of Kansas currently does not meet that state-level threshold. This makes even the county ineligible for FEMA funding. The State is searching for a work-around. The UG intends to use this FEMA funding for debris cleanup and financial support for BPU amongst other things.
