- To identify problems and seek solutions by bringing together neighborhood leaders and local government representatives.
- To create working partnerships that provide a positive impact on the livability of our neighborhoods.
- To strive to recommend programs and initiatives that will empower, rebuild and revitalize our community.

The Livable Neighborhoods Taskforce was originally created through a partnership of citizens and local government officials to address three areas of common concern: code enforcement, reduction of crime and delinquent taxes.

Livable Neighborhoods Taskforce meets regularly on the fourth Thursday of every month (with the exception of November and December) at 9 a.m. at the Neighborhood Resource Center, 4953 State Ave. The meetings provide informational speakers along with opportunities for open discussion on communitywide issues and innovative successful programs.

Livable Neighborhoods Task Force is committed to providing support and assistance to help promote the establishment of organized neighborhood groups.

Divisions within the Neighborhood Resource Center:


BUSINESS LICENSE

Business License is responsible for the billing and collection of occupation taxes for businesses. This division also issues regulatory permits and licenses including those for the sale of alcoholic beverages, garage sales, coin operated amusement devices, and taxicabs.



BUILDING INSPECTION

Building Inspection handles permits and inspections for building, electrical, plumbing, mechanical, demolition, and excavating.



RENTAL LICENSING AND INSPECTION

Rental Licensing and Inspection protects the character and stability of residential areas; corrects and prevents housing conditions that adversely affect life; ensures safety, general welfare, and health including physical, mental, and social wellbeing of persons occupying dwellings; enforces minimum standards; preserves the value of land and buildings; and protects the public from increased criminal activity that tends to occur in residential areas that are unstable due to dwellings that are blighted or substandard.

CODE ENFORCEMENT

Code Enforcement enhances the level of public safety and city aesthetics through effective enforcement of city ordinances and ensures due process for each citizen of Wyandotte County and KCK.

DEMOLITION AND ABATEMENT

Demolition promotes the safety of the community by razing blighted structures that are hazardous, abandoned, or structurally unsound.

COMMUNITY POLICING

Community Policing works together with residents to identify and solve neighborhood crime and quality of life issues. The unit assists with organizing and supporting neighborhood groups.

The unit's officers regularly attend neighborhood watch meetings; business/merchant association group meetings; and meet with citizen activists, church leaders, and other public service agencies and providers. The officers network with other police departments and governmental agencies to address crime, blight, and overall neighborhood concerns.

Each community policing officer is assigned to a specific area of the city. Call to find out who your community policing officer is.

CODE ENFORCEMENT PROCESS

Complaints are received from community members, neighborhood groups, the police department, and UG staff. Each complaint is logged and assigned to a code officer (responsible for an area of the city) who makes the initial inspection.

Research is done on ownership and property history. Notification is sent to all interested parties and an appropriate amount of time is given to address the issue depending on the type of violation.

A re-inspection date is scheduled when generating the letter and the property is inspected unless the homeowner has called and asked for an extension.

Once the case is corrected it is closed. If the case is not corrected, the codes officer can issue a court summons or give an extension if an effort has been made but not yet completed.

WHAT TO DO IF YOU RECEIVE A VIOLATION

If you have received a notice from the Code Enforcement office, there will be an inspector's name and number on the document. Please contact them as soon as possible to ask questions and get clarification. Define any extenuating circumstances that would make it difficult for you to comply and they will be willing to accommodate any reasonable requests. Inspectors spend a lot of time outside the office, so please leave a message and be patient when waiting for a response.

Top Code Issues

- Excessive grass and weeds over eight inches tall
- Structural dilapidation (paint, roofs, windows, and unsecured residence)
- Junk and trash strewn about the property
- Trash set out to curb improperly (Trash cans can be set out no earlier than 4 p.m. the night before scheduled pickup and removed no later than 7 a.m. the following day.)
- Dead trees and limbs that need disposed of or removed
- Illegal vehicles (not having tags, parked on grass, inoperable)
- Graffiti

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS



Streets

How can I get a pothole fixed near me?

The UG fixes potholes temporarily when the ground is frozen and repairs them permanently as soil conditions permit.



What if my street needs major repairs?

Resident requests will be prioritized during the annual resurfacing program. Due to limited funding, it may take years before the street gets repaired.



Who maintains the sidewalks and curbs in front of my house?

The UG will share the cost of sidewalk and curb repairs with an individual homeowner or business through the "sidewalk incentive program," that requires cooperation among a majority of owners along one side of a block to form a benefit district. The UG sometimes replaces curbs and sidewalks at no expense to the owners when reconstructing a major street.

Who is responsible for snow removal?

The UG clears streets as soon as possible after a snowfall. Homeowners are responsible for clearing the snow ridge left behind by plows.

Who replaces the bulbs in streetlights?

The Board of Public Utilities (BPU) replaces burned-out light bulbs.

How do I get a streetlight installed?

The UG will evaluate and prioritize the request within two weeks, BPU's installation can take up to six months.

Who replaces damaged traffic signs?

The UG replaces faded, damaged, or missing stop and yield signs within 24 hours of notification, and other traffic signs within 48 hours.



How do we get a neighborhood watch sign?

Neighborhood groups are responsible for purchasing their own watch signs and Public Works installs them.



Can we close our street for a block party?

The UG/Traffic Engineering issues permits for block parties and special events after a petition is signed by a majority of the residents or businesses with adjoining the streets. Allow two weeks to process the permit.

How Do I prepare my trash for pickup?

Trash in closed bags or cans should be set three feet from the curb. Trash cans must be smaller than 50-gallon capacity and weigh less than 50 pounds. Bulky items, such as furniture, beds, washers or dryers, should be set next to the trash cans. Limbs and twigs must be bundled and no longer than 48 inches. Tires must be removed from rims and set at the curb for pickup. There is a limit of two tires per week per residence.

When should I set my trash out?

Set out trash no later than 7 a.m. on collection day, but no earlier than 4 p.m. the day before.

Is trash pickup delayed for holidays?

Trash is not picked up on New Year's Day, Martin Luther King Jr. Day, Memorial Day, Independence Day, Labor Day, Thanksgiving Day, or Christmas Day. When one of these holidays falls on a weekday, pickup will be the next day.

What can't I put in the trash?

Household hazardous wastes such as motor oil, batteries, antifreeze, degreasers, lawn and garden insecticides/pesticides, household cleaning products, paints, varnishes, and solvents should not be set out or dumped in the sewer. These products should be taken to 2443 S. 88th St.

Arrange for a special pickup for appliances that have refrigerants in their systems, such as refrigerators, air conditioners, and freezers for no charge.

What items can I recycle at the curb?

Paper, paperboard, aluminum and steel cans, corrugated cardboard, cartons (milk or juice) and assorted plastic containers No. 1-No. 7.

What is the Recycling and Yard **Waste Center?**

The Recycling & Yard Waste Center is available at no charge to all residents. The Center accepts recyclable items including glass and yard waste such as grass clippings, garden trimmings, leaves, branches, and logs smaller than 12 inches in diameter and shorter than four feet in length. Recycling bins are also available. The Center is located at 3241 Park Drive and is open Thursday through Saturday 10 a.m. to 3 p.m. weather permitting.

Building and Permits

Do I need a permit for a shed or carport?

Yes, a permit is required for any accessory building over 120 square feet. Sheds, carports, garages, or barns are considered accessory buildings. Zoning determines how many are allowed.

Do I get driveway installation or repair permits from Building Inspections?

Driveway approaches or repairs to approaches to existing homes are issued and inspected through the City Engineers office on the 7th floor of the East Municipal Building.

Do I need a permit to replace siding and windows?

Permits for siding are required only if sheathing is replaced. Permits are required for window replacement.

How much does a building permit cost?

Except for new home construction, the fee is based on the cost of the project.

When can I burn my leaves and yard waste?

Open Burn season are times throughout the year dedicated to burning yard waste such as leaves, brush, and grass. There are two periods in the year when residents are allowed to conduct opening burning: the months of April and mid-October to mid-November. The Kansas City, KS Fire Department (KCKFD) strongly advises against open burning during unfavorable weather conditions like strong winds, air stagnation, and poor air quality. A permit is needed for opening burning. Visit the KCKFD website for information on Open Burn permits and frequently asked questions.

What is the Land Bank?

The duties of this division are to put delinquent tax properties back on the tax roll through various strategies that benefit the community. This includes marketing, removing prior year's taxes, maintaining an inventory list, accepting parcels as donations, and researching neighborhoods in Wyandotte County that contain properties with delinquent taxes. The UG manages a database of all properties located in Wyandotte County. This database is open to the public, but users must agree to a terms and conditions that prohibits the buying or selling of information within the database and solicitation of any kind.

Neighborhood Cleanups

How do I organize a neighborhood cleanup?

1. Choose a place and time.

Determine where and when you'd like to host a neighborhood cleanup. You'll need a place, date, and start time.

2. Contact Livable Neighborhoods

Livable Neighborhoods' office will make the event fliers, provide trash bags, and notify the proper waste collection authorities of your upcoming event.

3. Gather the supplies.

Although Livable Neighborhoods will supply the trash bags, you'll need to provide the other necessary items like gloves or trash pokers.

4. Rally your neighbors.

Distribute the event flyers and promote your neighborhood cleanup at nearby neighborhood group meetings.

5. Ensure trash pickup.

After the trash is all picked up, snap some pictures, text them to 913-433-6851, and let us know the cleanup is complete and ready to be collected.

What is the Adopt-a-Spot program?

Adopt-a-Spot is a volunteer program for individuals or groups that have an interest in keeping Wyandotte County litter-free. The UG has identified numerous spots such as streets, parks and Land Bank properties throughout the county that would benefit from cleanup efforts. Volunteers choose to "adopt" one of these spots, are asked to host three cleanup events a year, and in return a personalized sign will be placed at the adopted location.
