Providing high quality recreational activities for Wyandotte County youth continues to be of the Department's highest priorities. In 2022, we noted a significant increase of participation in basketball and indoor futsal. Stable participation numbers were witnessed in many sports.




### Adult Sports Teams by Activity in '21 & '22 36 20







Is there really any better way to spend a summer day in Wyandotte County than by boating or fishing at one of our lakes? Members of the community can purchase season fishing and boating permits at a rate of \$20 and \$30, respectively, with daily permits being offered for \$10 and \$15. Non-resident permits for boating and fishing are sold at higher rates to maintain equity. Finally, leased boat slips at the Wyandotte County Lake marina continue to be filled each summer.



### **OUTDOOR RECREATION**







Residents may begin renting shelters on the first business day of the calendar year. Shelters are available for rent from mid-April through mid-October, and vary in size, amenities, and pricing. Rental prices range from \$45 to \$120. In 2022, shelters at Wyandotte County Lake Park were the most popular. The 16 shelters located here were reserved 830 times, representative of nearly half of the 1,780 total shelter reservations seen in 2022.


# FACILITIES BY THE NUMBERS

Wyandotte County Lake Park features 16 shelters. In 2022, the Beach Shelter was reserved 92 times. Other shelters were reserved between 30 and 70 times. Wyandotte County Park features 7 shelters. Virtually all shelters in this park saw an uptick of usage. Shelter D was reserved the most often (76 times).





Pierson Park is located in central Wyandotte County and features 3 shelters. Shelters 1 and 2 were reserved 53 and 56 times in 2022, respectively. Shelter 3 was not available.




James P. Davis Hall, George Meyn Hall, and Pierson Community Center continue to be some of the most popular event spaces in Wyandotte County. Residents are able to reserve these facilities at lower cost than non-residents. Given its historic and rustic aesthetic, James P. Davis Hall is a very popular wedding venue and revenue north of \$60,000 was generated in 2022 from reservations.




Multipurpose rooms were reserved at an increased rate in virtually every community center in 2022 versus 2021. Of additional note is that the Department ceased operations at the Patricia Diane Kane Community Center at the end of 2021.




George Meyn Community Center



Community center gyms are generally reserved for sports team practices and tournaments. Occasionally, gyms are rented for private events such as birthday parties or community meetings



Residents are able to reserve ballfields for practices and tournaments. The Department maintains ballfields at 11 parks, with certain parks containing multiple fields. Overall, a slight increase in ballfield reservations was seen from 2021 (312) to 2022 (320).



In addition to ballfields, residents may also reserve soccer and multipurpose fields. These sort of fields are maintained at 8 different parks throughout the County. Similarly to the trend seen with ballfields, an increase of reservations from 181 in 2021, to 313 in 2022, was witnessed.

# **CAPITAL PROJECTS**

#### MARSHALL CREEK DREDGING

The cleaning and dredging of approximately 900 feet of channel in Marshall Creek was performed as a function of Wyandotte County Lake maintenance operations. Continued dredging of the Lake is planned to occur in the next 5 – 10 years.

#### WYCO LAKE MARINA **DOCKS & RESTROOM**

The boat slips available at Wyandotte County Lake Park's marina are one of the most utilized amenities in the county. As of 2022, interested renters were likely to spend 6 to 8 years on a wait list before a slip may become available. A new covered dock, consisting of fourteen slips, was added in spring 2022 to increase utilization of this resource and generate additional revenue to support park and recreation initiatives! The dock shared by Parks & Recreation and the Sheriff's Office was also replaced. Additionally, new restrooms were installed.

#### FOUR NEW RESTROOMS

The Department continues to prioritize the construction of new restrooms and water fountains in parks. With appropriate funding, staff was able to complete four new bathrooms with water fountains in St. Margaret's Park, Quindaro Park, Rosedale Park, Kensington Park, respectively, in 2022. Funding for these facilities was made available through the Coronavirus Aid, Relief, and Economic Security Act (CARES Act).

### **FITNESS COURT**

An outdoor fitness court was installed at Wyandotte County Lake Park to bring free fitness access to residents in western Wyandotte County. This was funded in part through a grant offered by the National Fitness Campaign, the same organization that aided in constructing a comparable venue at St. Margaret's Park in 2018.

### **PICKLEBALL COURTS**

Pickleball is a popular sport among all age groups. There has been a desire from the community to install pickleball courts in parks. Two regulation pickleball courts were installed at Wyandotte County Lake Park, one of the U.G.'s most utilized parks, to provide the community with a new place to play!

### **DISC GOLF COURSE**

The usage potential of City Park was further diversified in 2022 with the installation of an 18-hole Dynamic Discs disc golf course. It was purchased via funds from the Community Development Block Grant (CDBG), a program managed by the U.S. Department of Housing & Urban Development (HUD).

#### **KAW POINT PARK BUILDING**

Aside from being an aesthetically pleasing riverfront park, Kaw Point Park carries the historical significance of being where the Lewis and Clark Expedition landed on June 26, 1804, before continuing north up the Missouri River. To ensure its continued viability as a historical landmark, much of the Kaw Point maintenance building was replaced in 2022. The facility suffered significant

#### JAMES P. DAVIS HALL RENOVATIONS

Due to its traditional beauty, James P. Davis Hall is one of the most popular banquet facilities in the Kansas City metro area. It generated a significant amount of revenue that is used to fund U.G. operations, including those performed by our Department. A kitchen renovation occurred in 2022 and a fire suppression update will be completed in 2023 to ensure the facility's viability for years to come!

#### AZURA AMPHITHEATER DREDGING

Azura Amphitheater is truly an entertainment gem in Wyandotte County. World-renowned artists have performed at this venue for more than 30 years. As a U.G.-owned property that is leased, it is our responsibility to maintain it and preserve structures from harm. In 2022, the creek that flows through the site was dredged to reduce costs associated with flood damage.

#### BEATRICE LEE COMMUNITY CENTER RENOVATION

Preservation of community centers is critical to our ability to provide welcoming spaces for residents to live and play. In 2022, structural damage was mitigated when the Beatrice Lee Community Center's north wall was repaired.

### **CLIFTON PARK**

Community Development Block Grants (CDBG) issued by the U.S. Department of Housing & Urban Development (HUD) continue to play a vital role in supporting the building of infrastructure in our parks. In 2022, Clifton Park witnessed a major face lift consisting of a new sidewalk loop, parking lot, and park entrance. The upgrades did not stop last year though as a new spray park and playground will be operational in the coming months!



# **FISCAL REVIEW**

The 2022 Amended operating budget for the Parks and Recreation Department was \$10,882,175. This amount accounted for the personnel costs, contractual services, and commodity expenses necessary to provide a high quality of parks and recreational services to Wyandotte County.

7% of operating costs, or \$718,577, were recovered in 2022. It should be noted that this figure does not account for grants received, the casino contribution, or minimal miscellaneous revenues. Additionally, revenue incurred by the Sunflower Hills Golf Course was not considered since the entity is supported through its own enterprise fund.

A variance of sources made up the total amount of costs recuperated in 2022. The greatest category was Recreational Activities which contributed 62% of all costs recovered. The 2nd highest category was Other Special Grants (12%), followed by the Renaissance Festival Lease Payment (11%), Casino Contribution (11%), Residential Rentals (3%), Chemical Sales (1%), and Other Revenues (1%).





The highest generating category in 2022 was Outdoor A slight decline in recreational costs recovered was Recreation Fees (23%), which represents proceeds witnessed in 2022 (\$575,929) versus 2021 (\$636,333). incurred via the sale of fishing and boating permits. On the contrary, since staff Rental Facilities (21%), i.e., shelters and park field rentals, was able to secure the Child Care Aware Grant, Summer Banquet Halls (19%), i.e., James P. Davis Hall, George Camp was offered free of charge. Other notable items Meyn Hall, and Pierson Community Center, Marina Dock include the fact that the adult soccer league gained 16 Slip Rentals (12%), and Adult Recreation (12%). teams and that Parkwood Pool reopened for the 2022 aquatic season.







A key responsibility that the Department maintains is mowing. In 2022, internal and external mowing crews ensured that parks, vacant lots, trails, paths, medians, Buildings and Logistics sites, Water Pollution Control pump and manhole sites, and cemeteries were maintained. To ensure that all assigned sites are mowed on a regular basis, mowing tasks are split between internal Parks & Recreation staff and multiple contractors.
