

News comes from Kansas City of the drowning of Oran Stone. He is a nephew of S. Stone of Horton. Four boys had gone swimming just at the edge of the city limits in Kansas City, Kansas. Earl Bennefeld jumped in and went beyond his depth. He called for help and Oran Stone went to his rescue, but became entangled in a barb wire fence and both were drowned. Mr. S. Stone, of Horton went to Kansas City to attend the funeral.

Earl Bennefeld and Oron Stone both drowned in 1904. They were buried next to Bennefeld's twin brother who had passed away as a baby.

Boys Drowned in Wyandotte.

Wyandotte, Kan., July 11.—In a brave struggle to save 11-year-old Earl Bennefeld from drowning in a pond at Twenty-fifth street and Reynolds avenue, Oran Stone, 17 years old, was dragged beneath the water and both boys were drowned before help could be summoned.



Orrin Larrabee Miller
Born January 11th, 1856
Died September 11, 1926



Orrin Larrabee Miller moved to Kansas City, KS in 1880 and engaged in the practice of law. He was appointed and subsequently elected district judge for the 29th judicial district of Kansas in 1887-1891. On March 4, 1895 he was elected as a Representative from Kansas. He served until March 3rd, 1897. He declined to be a candidate in 1896. Orrin Larrabee Miller continued to practice law in Kansas City, Kansas until his death on September 11, 1926



The remains of the late Judge John B. Scroggs were removed yesterday from Oak Grove vault to the family vault at Woodlawn, which has just been completed.

Died: June 28, 1899


Scroggs moved to Wyandott in 1866 and became one of the leading attorneys in the county.

He was the second husband of Margaret (Kersetter) Cruise-Scroggs. (The couple were original owners of what is today the Strawberry Hill Museum.)


At the time of his death he was placed in the Public Vault in Oak Grove Cemetery awaiting the completion of the Scroggs Family vault at Woodlawn Cemetery.

In the 1990s the Scroggs vault began to fall in. John and his family were then removed and buried in Memorial Park Cemetery. And the vault at Woodlawn was closed up.

The concrete name plates were removed from this vault and are now stored at the Strawberry Hill Museum.



- •John Stockton came to Wyandotte County in 1858. He was a member of the KCKS Bar Association and served as Mayor four different times.
- •He and his wife Cora donated the land where Woodlawn Cemetery now sits.
- •Two weeks prior to his death he was seen taking care of the cemetery in preparation for Arbor Day. He planted numerous trees and shrubs.
- •Local newspapers noted that he was laid to rest in the shade of the trees he planted with his own hands. When the funeral hearse reached the cemetery, the line of carriages was still forming at his residence at 6th and Oakland.



William Warren Rose

Died: May 23, 1931 at the age of 67

- •Rose moved to KCK, in 1896.
- •He served as Mayor from 1905-1906.
- •He had an architecture practice with David B. Peterson, known for the Wyandotte High School, City Library, Bethany Hospital, the Scottish Rite Temple and Memorial Hall in KCK.



The Colored Defenders of Freedom Memorial. This memorial was dedicated on Memorial Day 1905, by the Sumner Relief Corps Post #22. The inscription reads...


"Erected in Memory of the known and unknown Colored Soldiers and Sailors who fought in defense of the Union from 1861-1865."

It is believed to be the only memorial in the entire United States with this type of specific inscription.

On June 17, 1933, Kansas City Missouri Police Detective Frank E. Hermanson was sent to meet other officers arriving at Union Station with federal prison escapee, Frank Nash. It is believed that an informant had relayed the information regarding the arrival of Nash and his law enforcement escorts to gangsters throughout the metropolitan area. The officers were not prepared for the ambush at the Union Station. Detectives William J. Grooms and Frank E. Hermanson, F.B.I. agent Raymond J. Caffrey, Oklahoma Police Chief Otto Reed, and the prisoner, Frank Nash, were all killed by the mobsters. Charles Arthur "Pretty Boy Floyd", Adam Richetti and Vernon C. Miller are believed to be the responsible mobsters. Hermanson was buried in Woodlawn Cemetery.



Frank Hermanson was originally buried in grave six, the marker on the right are his parents John and Anna. The remains of Frank were removed from this grave on June 21, 1950, but the cemetery did not keep record of his new location. Years later his remains were found at Highland Park Cemetery.



St. Margaret's Hospital opened its doors on April 15th, 1887. It was officially dedicated in November of that same year.

Henry Anderson, a tinner, died on Monday at St. Margaret's hospital. His was the first death that has occurred at that institution.
